With 273 contestants from across the United States, including one from Brazil, the 2010 CMSA Eastern United States Championship now holds the record as the largest Eastern ever. Record entry numbers were set in several classes. All told, the numbers verified the fact that the CMSA Eastern U.S. Championship is the third largest Cowboy Mounted Shooting Competition in the World. The superb quality of the shooters and horses was evident throughout the entire field of participants making the event especially interesting for spectators and enthusiasts alike.

Kenda Lenseigne of Ellensburg,
Washington continued with her
winning ways taking the Overall.
She has won the Overall at CMSA's
three largest mounted shooting
competitions—the World, the
National and the Eastern in
sequence. Nobody has ever done
this before. It's another first for
Cowboy Mounted Shooting, Kenda
and her quarter horse Lieutenant
Justin. Kenda also won the
Champion Cowgirl title, the Double

Down and picked up money for her class win and fourth place in the Colt Eliminator.

Natalie Johnson of Cave Creek. Arizona easily slipped into the Reserve Champion Cowgirl slot while placing Second Overall. Incidentally this is the first time that cowgirls have taken first and second overall at a major CMSA Big Four Championships. John Clark of Morrison, Tennessee took the Champion Cowboy title. John's willingness to trade all-out speed for precision and consistency continues to pay dividends. He has piled up one major title after another through good course management and horsemanship discipline.
